Reflection Questions:

1. Primeval History:

How does the story of Adam and Eve help us understand the nature and consequences of human sin today?

2. Patriarchs and Matriarchs:

What can the repeated pattern of crisis and God's faithfulness in the lives of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob teach us about trusting in God's promises?

3. Egypt and the Exodus:
